IN LIGHT OF A RECENT CAR FIRE INCIDENT INVOLVING A KIA AT THE NADLEH WHUT'EN BAND OFFICE, IT'S ESSENTIAL TO PRIORITIZE VEHICLE SAFETY. WHILE INVESTIGATIONS ARE ONGOING, IT'S CRUCIAL TO NOTE THAT VEHICLE FIRES CAN STEM FROM VARIOUS CAUSES UNRELATED TO A SPECIFIC BRAND.HERE ARE OUICK FIRE SAFETY TIPS:

- ROUTINE MAINTENANCE: REGULARLY SERVICE YOUR VEHICLE, FOCUSING ON THE ELECTRICAL SYSTEM, FUEL LINES, AND
 ENGINE COMPONENTS.
- BE VIGILANT: WATCH FOR SIGNS LIKE UNUSUAL ODORS, SMOKE, OR LEAKS, AND SEEK PROFESSIONHELP PROMPTLY. EMERGENCY READINESS: KEEP A FIRE EXTINGUISHER IN YOUR CAR, KNOW ITS LOCATION, AND UNDERSTAND HOW TO
- SMART PARKING: CHOOSE PARKING SPACES AWAY FROM BUILDINGS OR OTHER VEHICLES AND AVOID DRY VEGETA-TION.
- QUICK RESPONSE: IN CASE OF A FIRE, PRIORITIZE PERSONAL SAFETY, EVACUATE THE VEHICLE, AND CONTACT EMERGEN-CY SERVICES.

BY STAYING INFORMED AND PROACTIVE, WE CONTRIBUTE TO A SAFER COMMUNITY. IF YOU HAVE VEHICLE SAFETY CONCERNS, REACH OUT TO LOCAL AUTHORITIES OR AUTOMOTIVE PROFESSIONALS PROMPTLY.








We hope this message finds you well. As the colder months approach, we are pleased to inform you that we have successfully acquired firewood to support our community during the winter season.

Our primary goal is to ensure that everyone in our community stays warm and comfortable. To achieve this, we will be distributing firewood in an organized and fair manner, prioritizing those who need it the most. Please read the following guidelines:

Distribution Priority:

Elderly (60+): Our cherished elders will be the first to receive firewood. Their comfort and well-being are of

utmost importance to us.

Single Mothers: We understand the challenges single mothers may face during the winter. They will be next in line to receive firewood.

People with Disabilities: Individuals with disabilities will also receive their allocation to ensure they are well-prepared for the winter season.

Cooperation and Fairness:

We kindly request that all community members respect this distribution order. We aim to assist everyone in need, and your cooperation will ensure fairness and efficiency.

Please DO NOT raid the pile: Our resources are limited, and we want to ensure that they are used effectively. By following the distribution order, we can help those who need it most while preventing unnecessary waste.
